A Remarkable Story in Memory of Dr. Peter Sudermann February 22, 1923 – July 31st, 2006

This July 31st, 2021, marks the 15th Anniversary of our Father's passing. Where he is resting peacefully at the Victoria Beach Cemetery. The story of how he got to Canada and then Victoria Beach is a fascinating one and we have shared a condensed version of his journey below.

1923 Born in Waldheim (Southern Russia) The first language at home was German, then Ukrainian. There was a shortage of trained agronomists in the new Soviet system, and as an administrator for State Agricultural Farms, Peter's father Leonhard, was in demand and was often transferred from farm to farm in rural areas, maybe fifteen times by the time Peter was fifteen. His mother, however, had to live in the city to teach. Separated during the week, the parents commuted to be with family on weekends. As a result of the many moves, Peter grew up with little attachment to a place or permanent friends. He and his brothers were close. In wintertime they enjoyed skiing because the easy availability of ski equipment in Russia: the Soviet military subsidized ski equipment after encountering the better-prepared Finnish ski troops in the Russo-Finnish War.

1932 They moved to Dnepropetrovsk then came the Great Purge of 1936-38 by Stalin. Peter's father was transferred to a Sovkhoz near Dnepropetrovsk [Dnipro now]. This state farm belonged to the NKVD (now the KGB). Supplying food stuffs for officers of the OGPU/NKVD gave Leonhard Sudermann and his family some security. In Dnepropetrovsk the family got to live together. The kids rode to school in a horse and carriage or sleigh. The kids knew that party leaders were being purged (1936-38) when the pictures of certain Communist leaders disappeared overnight from the walls at school. During the disastrous famine of 1933-34, Peter's hobby of raising rabbits provided needed protein. Peter was expelled from school for insubordination even though he was an A student—he made fun of the teacher who conducted compulsory military exercises.

Peter finished school in Dnepropetrovsk 1940. Not eighteen, Peter was not yet eligible to be drafted into the Red Army. At this point, he applied to university to become a naval engineer. (He had always been fascinated by Amundsen and other famous explorers.) But he was rejected, because he was ethnic German.

1939-40 Hitler-Stalin Non-Aggression Pact, August 1939, and Peter's move to Lvov. A former student of Peter's mother became the party boss of this newly formed Soviet province in

Ukraine, and through his influence Peter gained acceptance to the University in

Lvov/Lviv/Lemberg after being cleared by the NKVD [in 1940] to study electrical engineering. If students finished the first year, deferment from the draft was customary. Peter found material life so much better in Lvov. Resistance to the Soviet regime was strong in formerly Polish Lvov. At the same time, Peter found Lvov a beautiful, European-type city with well-nourished people and plenty of consumer goods. He began to doubt the Communist system and Soviet propaganda. Peter studied in Lvov where he finished two semesters [1940-41]. [He was eighteen at this point.] Exams included compulsory basics of Marxism-Leninism. Peter found theoretical mechanics difficult, and a professor encouraged him to switch to study of music, much to Peter's amusement, since he thought of himself as tone deaf.

1941 Peter visits brother Leonhard: Prior to the Nazi invasion of the Soviet Union.

Peter's brother Leonhard, now in the Red Army and stationed




in the Carpathian Mountains, came to visit him. Peter remembers skiing three or four days from Lvov into the Carpathians to return the visit to his brother.

June 1941 the Germans attack the Soviet Union and bombed Lvov. Evacuation from Lvov, 1941. The evacuation process was chaotic, involving random shootings and executions by [Ukrainian] partisans. Peter could speak and understand both Ukrainian and Polish and remained safe. The evacuation went by train to the old Russian border, and when they crossed the border, Peter found the poverty there terrible, a huge contrast to the better conditions in Lvov. It was here that Peter met some members of the Hansch Family (who went on to form Hansch Construction in Winnipeg).

1942 were know as the "Wander Years" were he bounced around trying to avoid capture (many interesting stories and adventures to numerous for this issue of The Herald). However, Peter was captured, "AII of a sudden," Peter says, "I was gazing into the hot end of a machine gun." The weapon was mounted on the sidecar of a motorcycle. Peter lifted his hands to surrender, and "to my horror, they were Italians, not Germans." The captors took away Peter's canvas boots. It was cold but no snow yet. The prisoners were marched toward Stalino (Donetsk), placed in a camp, and forced to work salvaging bricks from bombed ruins. They had frozen cabbage soup to eat. Prospects for survival seemed dim, so Peter and several fellow prisoners knocked out a guard and escaped. They wandered around for a while, living off of the land.

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In 1943 he learned that his brother Leonhard had been kill.

He then learned that the German occupation administration was recruiting young persons—[Peter was twenty at the time] to study medicine in Berlin. He would have agreed, he always said, even to study theology to get out of the war. Peter arrived in Marburg, Germany, to begin medical studies in October I, 1943. He found it peaceful and pleasant. Allied planes flew over to bomb the big cities but not Marburg.

He could not avoid joining the German military in the winter 1944-45. Finally, Peter received his draft notice and was sent for training to Pomerania, where he received a uniform and weapon.

He and his Unit fought many battles. In one battle in March, 1945 he was throwing a hand grenade at a Russian soldier coming out of a building when he felt as though someone had hit him with a baseball bat from the back. He turned around to see who it was and realized he had been wounded. We can all remember as young kids at Victoria Beach the bullet wound in his back. He recovered in the Spring of 1945 with American and Allied Troops advancing and the war near an end.

He studied medicine in Göttingen and became a doctor in 1949 and emigrated to Canada in Spring, 1950. Finally receiving the papers he needed to emigrate, Peter boarded the Liberty ship General McCrae in Bremerhaven and sailed for Canada. He served as the ship's doctor for the voyage. Even in Canada, he comments, deportation back to Russia was a theoretical possibility. But officials did not know he was born in Russia, since he had managed to alter identity papers from "Waldheim, USSR" to Waldheim, Germany." No evidence remained that he had been born in Russia. Arriving in Halifax, Peter headed for Manitoba by colonist bus. (He had signed a contract for farm employment in Lorette, Manitoba. With no immediate family alive after the war. Relatives in Kitchener tried to persuade Peter to stay there, because "a flood was coming," but a contract was a contract, and he felt compelled to go on to Winnipeg. "I arrived in Winnipeg in the middle of the Flood of 1950. During the flood only work on the dikes was available. The Salvation Army provided food."

After that, Peter got a job as an orderly at the General Hospital. Then came a job as "doctor-under-supervision" followed by exams, internship at General Hospital, and his license to practice medicine. After a year of practice in Vita, Manitoba, Peter opted for post-graduate training in Winnipeg. That is where he met Barbara Henderson, an operating-room nurse, "and we eventually married." The honeymoon was at Victoria Beach at 3rd and Patricia. He was the Victoria Beach Doctor in 1958/59. He became a Pediatric General Surgeon and worked out of the Winnipeg Clinic until retirement in the 1990s.

In the Summer of 1970 Barb and Peter bought the cottage at 207 Sunset where Barb can still be seen to this day on the Cliff overlooking the beach or on the beach socializing in the Sun with almost everyone she meets.

Peter loved Victoria Beach in the Summer and downhill skiing in the Winter at Mount Agassiz.

His Legacy is 5 children, 13 Grand children, and 5 and soon to be 6 great grand children, and his beautiful wife (Mom) Barb. A great life lived.

Dave Drybrough – a Life Well Lived

This summer, the Victoria Beach tennis community is missing a fierce competitor, a coordinator of tournaments and fundraising and, perhaps most importantly, a larger-than-life fan.

Dave Drybough lost his battle with cancer in March. He was 84. He faced his third fight with the disease with optimism, humour and gratitude.

He was one of the driving forces of tennis at Victoria Beach tennis for more than a last halfcentury.

He is survived by his "bride" of 59 years, Connie, son Keith (Kirsten) Drybrough and their children, Julia and Madelaine of Winnipeg; son Dan (Marjolein) Drybrough of Calgary, AB and their children, Benjamin, Jack and Samuel; and daughter Heather Drybrough and her children, Jane and Isabel Askham, also of Calgary.

Time at the family cottage on



Eighth Avenue was precious for Drybrough, as was the annual trek that he and Connie took to Hawaii. He excelled on the courts, winning multiple titles in the annual Victoria Beach open tournament in singles and men's and mixed doubles. He ran the tournament for several years and helped do the draws of what

would ultimately become the biggest tennis event in Manitoba.

Dan remembers his dad having just finished the draw one year and sitting around with fellow organizers drinking a few stubby beers when somebody knocked on the door. It was a just-arrived renter who had caught wind about

the tournament and asked if he could enter.

"Absolutely. We'd be more than happy to have you join our tournament," Drybrough told him.

Minutes later, he was erasing parts of the draw and redoing them to include the new entrant.

"He wanted everybody to be involved," Dan says.

When he turned 40 and realized the younger generation wasn't going to let him relive past glories, Drybrough simply started a masters tournament for those no longer in their thirties.

His on-court battles with good friend Rolly Ruhr were the stuff of legend. Drybrough wasn't shy about telling the naming story of the trophy which is awarded to the masters singles winner every year. He and Ruhr agreed to jointly donate the trophy with the caveat that whoever lost in the final that year would go first on the trophy name.

"So, it's the Ruhr-Drybrough trophy," he would say with a laugh. Drybrough was instrumental, along with Ross Yarnell, in ex-

panding the three shale courts into six hard courts in the early 1980s. Today, the V.B. courts are arguably the top tennis destination in the entire province.

Heather remembers going door-to-door with her dad soliciting donations from fellow cottagers. Most people, even non-tennis players, were happy to get out their chequebooks.

"We went to one cottage and the guy told us, 'I'm not giving any money for the tennis courts because we don't have new cards for the bridge club," she says. "We should have told him new cards were included with a donation."

While Drybrough wasn't shy about pointing out to a new winner of a tennis event the plaques on the trophy from his heyday, he wasn't one to brag about his greatest sporting exploits.

"He was the dominant runner in Manitoba from the mid-1950s to the early 1960s," says Rick Brownlee, executive director of the Manitoba Sports Hall Of Fame. "He was the national cross-country champion in 1956."

Perhaps his grandest moment was setting the Canadian record for the mile in front of a home crowd at the national indoor track and field championships, breaking the tape in 4:10:4 at the Winnipeg Arena in 1960.

A four-minute mile was the gold standard back in that era and Brownlee is quick to note that times are typically slower inside due to the many tight turns on the smaller tracks.

Drybrough also represented Manitoba internationally in 1958 and 1959 when he ran the mile at the Drake Relays at Drake University in Des Moines, Iowa.

"They were a really big deal. All of the American universities would send their best. It was an invite-only event. He finished seventh in both races," Brownlee said, before adding for empha-



sis. "That's seventh in North America."

Drybrough also shone at the 1959 Pan Am Games trials, finishing second in the 1,500 metres and third in the 3,000-metre steeple chase, earning a spot on the Canadian team that summer.

"He won his 1,500 semi-final but he was (clipped from behind) with two laps to go in the final, fell and didn't finish," Brownlee said.

After retiring, he coached the University of Manitoba crosscountry team to a national championship in 1964.

A chartered accountant by trade, Drybrough was inducted into the MSHOF in 2009 as both an athlete and a builder. He signed its "wall of fame" in 2009. When he heard that hockey stars Bobby Hull and Ulf Nilsson had signed five years later right beside his signature, he thought it was only appropriate.

"I would have scored more goals on the Hot Line than Anders Hedberg anyway," he deadpanned. (Hedberg finally signed in 2018, also right by Drybrough's signature.)

After spending so much time on the move, there were moments when Drybrough wanted nothing more than to sit in his recliner and watch some sports on television.

"Watching the Olympics was so important to him. In the summer of 1976, he rented a colour TV — because we didn't own one — and brought it down to the lake," Dan says.

RM of Victoria Beach declared Winner among Small Municipalities

Recent VB Council reports have mentioned the ongoing efforts to make Victoria Beach more accessible. Not only are residents benefitting from these improvements, but other Manitobans are taking note.

On December 3, 2020, the International Day for Persons with Disabilities, the Manitoba government celebrated the RM of Victoria Beach as a champion of accessibility during the inaugural Manitoba Accessibility Awards. (See AccessibilityMB.ca).

Reeve Penny Mc Morris credits the council's enthusiastic Accessibility Committee for its vision. This committee helped create Victoria Beach's first Accessibility Plan in 2018, as required by The Accessibility for Manitobans Act.

Accessible pathways, ramps to buildings and even the new garbage bins, automatic doors and upgrades to washrooms in public buildings are just some of the accessibility enhancements that have been put in place over the last few years. You may have already noticed the increasing number of mobility scooters in our community. Did you know we now have a rental service and charging station, conveniently located at the community parking lot?

The Reason We Walk

The Richardson-Mason family giggled when asked if its okay to use both of their last names for this interview. The couple were each raised here at Victoria Beach, met and married at the lake and have now raised their family here. You could say that lake water flows thickly through their veins. Trish and Mike's lives evolved around their activities and experiences on the shores of Lake Winnipeg, especially in their relationship to the water and the beach, from kayaking and windsurfing to swimming and playing games in the lake. Later, they had the great joy of introducing their infant daughters to lake life and watching them grow in their appreciation of the lake.

Walking in Lake Winnipeg's annual Walk For Water has long been just the natural thing for this family to do. They join their fellow lakers each summer to demonstrate how much they value the health and sustainability of the lake.

Now, as the parents of energetic teens, Trish and Mike also get to watch younger families encounter the lake all over again. It's a place to gather, to enjoy nature, to learn about the shorebirds and aquatic life, and to form and re-form beach community. Clean lake water is pivotal to this communal encounter.

The life-lakers also observed that beyond this shared lifestyle experience is an acute awareness for their family of the importance of the health of Lake Winnipeg and its watershed. Living on the shores of one of the largest freshwater lakes in the world, what we have here is a natural jewel, something we value and need to protect. And yet despite knowing the challenges and the solutions for our endangered lake for decades now, its future remains in the balance. The health of the aquatic systems, the lives of Indigenous and settler communities who have lived around the lake for generations, the economic impacts to its fishery, tourism, and cottagers is beyond calculation. Losing this freshwater lake to human-induced degradation would be crazy, Trish and Mike observed. People all over the world are suffering from a lack of clean water. Here we have it in abundance and yet are in the process of squandering it.

Some ready answers come to hand: As Winnipeggers, Trish and Mike have been pro-active in pushing for the upgrade to the North End Sewage Treatment plant in Winnipeg (see last week's Herald for the update) and have contributed to lake and shoreline clean-ups and information sessions. And they walk.

The Richardson-Mason family walks for water because it is a sign of unity and concern for people of all political stripes who agree that the health of Lake Winnipeg broadens the narrative beyond ideologies and into the realm of human's relationship to their natural environment. Heavy stuff, for sure, but essential for our lake and more broadly, for our world. We can't continue to degrade either our water or our world. They are certain that it is within our grasp to bring about the change.

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

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Council News

It's hard to believe that half the summer is almost over; and what a summer it has been! Every day the number of people who are taking the step to help return to normalcy, protect themselves, their family members, and our community continues to rise by the simple act of getting their Covid-19 vaccinations. Because of this success, Council is looking to once again host our meetings live at the Social Scene. Provided there are not any further Provincial or Federal restrictions, the RMVB Council will have our first in person meeting on August 17th. Note that only residents who are double vaccinated and in possession of a valid Covid-19 vaccination passport will be allowed entry to the meeting.

As we are all aware, Victoria Beach - along with most of Canada - continues to get pummeled by drought conditions. This has made for an exceptionally dry year for our RM.

Unfortunately, this is the 5th drought year in a row. Therefore, Council would like to remind all residents that coniferous trees (evergreens) pose a substantial fire hazard to our community. Coniferous trees burn anywhere from five to 10 times faster than of species of leafy trees (agric.gov.ab.ca). This is because they contain flammable resin and have an incredible amount of surface area due to their production of needles rather than water filled leaves. To protect your property from the threat of this type of tree, remove and replace them with drought tolerant deciduous trees (leafy trees) and do not plant conifers on your property. More information about how to protect your property can be found on the FireSmart website at firesmartcanada.ca. If we all do our part, we can protect our community and properties from a catastrophic fire.

Due to the ongoing drought conditions, Council recognizes our residents desire to irrigate their properties. However, residents are asked to refrain from using spray irrigation. There have been several times this summer where the supply has come close to not being able to keep up with demand. Should this happen, the Victoria Beach and Albert Beach plants could be forced to shut down. Furthermore, this surge in demand - brought about by the irrigation demands of the community - puts an increased strain on the machinery, which may limit its life span. So please, limit your use of water for irrigation purposes.

Effective alternatives to spray irrigation are the following: drip lines, soaker hoses, and subsurface irrigation. These alternative irrigation methods are more effective than spray irrigation and reduce water consumption between 60-85%. If you must irrigate your trees, shrubs, or garden, please use these irrigation methods to limit your water consumption. Together we can support our water treatment plants, limit their wear and tear, and become better stewards of our home.

Council would also like to remind all residents that fireworks in the RM of Victoria Beach are permanently banned. Violators of BY-LAW NO. 1589 will be subject to up to a \$1,000 fine.

Residents of Wanasing will notice that the garbage bin has been moved. This was done in consideration of the safety of residents and our bears. Garbage should now be brought to the depot at Public Works.



Council would also like to remind all residents that garbage should never be left outside in a bag for pickup. Garbage must be in a container to limit the attraction of bears. Next year it will be mandatory for residents who want garbage pick up to have a bear resistant bin. If you do not have a bear resistant bin, you can obtain one by contacting Councillor Bartmanovich at mbartmanovich@victoriabeach.ca.

Regarding garbage and waste, please note that the only items to be dropped off at our garbage site is standard household garbage only. All other items must be taken to the Traverse Bay Landfill along highway 11. Every item that our Public Works employees must bring there increases our municipal taxes. So, let's keep taxes low and bring items that don't belong in the Public Works garbage site to the landfill along highway 11.

Council would also like to remind residents to review the new proposed zoning bylaw on the municipal website. The zoning bylaw has passed first reading and will require a public hearing when one can be effectively and safely arranged. In the meantime, Council welcomes the input of all residents of the RM.

A reminder that the COVID-19 vaccines are safe. They will keep you out of the hospital, out of the ICU, and on the right side of the ground. Getting your vaccine is the best way to help protect you, your family, your friends, and your community from this virus. Remember, the variants are now targeting all age groups and even those with traditionally strong immune systems. So, protect yourself and everyone around you and get your CIVUD-19 vaccine. 

The Victoria Beach Film Festival is Back!



Doc asks whether success at sport justifies abuse and manipulation of athletes

Well, it seems that the VB Film Festival will be back this year! While many things have been uncertain over the last many months, the talent of local film makers has been unwavering, as has their support for this event.

We will be keeping the programs relatively short this year, but we're making up for that with quality.

On Saturday, July 31, from 7:30-8:30 pm, we'll be showing all four parts of The Lake Winnipeg Project, directed by Kevin Settee and made available by the NFB. These short documentaries give

us a window into four different communities on Lake Winnipeg, their love for the lake, their reliance on it, and their fierce determination to protect it.

The story of Camp Morningstar, a sacred camp established on the Hollow Water First Nation, will be of special interest to VBers. Hollow Water First Nation is an Anishinaabe (Ojibwa) first nation located 75 kilometres north of Pine Falls. Its members erected Camp Morningstar in response to the proposal of the silica sand mine that so many VBers were concerned about. It also explores Camp Morningstar's historical and spiritual connections to territory, the role of ceremony and spirituality, and the power of collective action.

The other parts of the Lake Winnipeg Project look at Matheson Island, which is located at the narrows of Lake Winnipeg, Fisher River Cree Nation (Ochekwi-Sipi), located on the west side of the north basin of Lake Winnipeg, and Poplar River First Nation (Azaadiwi-ziibi Nitam-Anishinaabe), an Ojibwa First Nation on the east side of the north basin of Lake Winnipeg.

On Sunday, August 1, at 7:30 pm, we'll be showing two awardwinning long-form documentaries. The first, Nike's Big Bet, was directed by Paul Kemp, a long-time summer resident of VB. Nike established the Oregon Project in 2001 as a ground-breaking program to develop elite track and field runners and put Americans back on top of the Olympic podium. Coaching legend Alberto Salazar was put in charge and was given free reign to employ his unorthodox training tactics to deliver results. His successes were astounding, with him developing Olympic and World champions. However, in 2019, despite his athletes never once testing positive in a drug test, he received a four-year international doping ban from all coaching activities. The Nike Oregon Project immediately collapsed. To his fans, including an outspoken Malcolm Gladwell, Salazar's methods justified the means by pushing the competitive boundaries of what's fair in sport. But to others, including former protégés, he was abusive and manipulativewielding an unchecked control over their careers and well-being. With a win-at-all-costs attitude and a sport built upon testing the margins of human limits, is Salazar a villain or hero?

The second, Vivi's Vision, was produced and directed by another long-time resident of VB, Leona Krahn. In it, we follow Vivi Dabee, a first-time playwright who was thrilled to be selected as part of the 2019 Winnipeg Fringe Theatre Festival. However, if writing and producing a play isn't daunting enough already, Vivi is doing it without her sight. Her play is based on the Harlem Renaissance novel Passing by Nella Larsen which tells the dramatic story of a mixed-race woman who passes for white, married to a bigoted husband who doesn't know her true identity until he makes the startling discovery - with fatal results. Vivi relates strongly to the novel as she is not only blind but mixed race so "passes" often in life to better cope with her incredible challenges.

We hope you'll join us for one or both nights! Just a reminder: COVID protocols will be followed. At the moment, they mean that masks must be worn, social distancing must be observed. proof of full vaccination (vaccination card or QR Code) will be required for those 12 and up, and anyone 11 or under must come with a fully vaccinated caregiver. In addition, fans will not be used because they negate social distancing.

Finally, thanks to the Kemp kids for putting up posters for me, to Chris Mason of South Beach Photoworks for another awesome poster photo, and John Lyttle for working his graphic design magic again!

Once everyone in the classes in front of them are secure, they will then let the swim convenors know of any cancelations. From there, as we discussed during the initial registration process and in our swim rules and regulations (yellow form), we will post a notice on @vbclubmb on Instagram and Twitter. The primary culprit that leads to cancelation of lessons is lightening.... Rain, or even heavy rain at times, is not necessarily going to lead to cancelled classes, as they are often moved into the clubhouse for water safety training.




